## **KISS YARD WASTE STICKERS GOOD-BYE!**

**Yard waste season runs April 1<sup>st</sup> through November 29<sup>th</sup>, 2017**

The Village Board is happy to announce that due to a successful negotiation with Advanced Disposal for a contract extension, Yard Waste Stickers will no longer be required. Yard waste may be disposed of in a paper disposable yard waste bag or a standard waste container marked with an "X". Branches may be bundled not exceeding 4 feet in length, and 18 inches in diameter and under 50 pounds. Yard waste material that is not properly prepared will not be collected.

Effective May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017 there will be a \$1 increase in your monthly garbage rate. This is quite a bargain considering it includes unlimited yard waste pick-up each week without having to buy individual stickers for each container or bundle. Last year these sold for \$2.60 each! The electronic recycling bin will continue to be available and maintained by Advanced Disposal at the Public Works Building on the north side. Please remember electronics cannot be placed curbside but can be placed in the bin at Public Works.

***All garbage containers need to be stored on the side of the house, in the backyard or inside the garage, NOT IN FRONT OF THE GARAGE OR HOUSE!***

Office, Fremont Public Library, Highland Park Police Station, Lake Barrington Village Hall, Lake County Central Permit Facility, Lake Forest City Hall, Round Lake Village Hall, Vernon Twp. Office, Zion City Hall)

April 3<sup>rd</sup> - Last day for early voting at State mandated extended hour sites (Gurnee Village Hall, Jane Addams Center, Lake County Courthouse and Administrative Complex, North Chicago City Hall)

**April 4<sup>th</sup> - ELECTION DAY (All Hainesville residents vote at Hainesville Village Hall)**

April 6<sup>th</sup> - Voter registration reopens.

## BE PROACTIVE AND PREPARE BEFORE THE TORNADO "SEASON" BEGINS.

### BEFORE A TORNADO:

- Build an emergency kit and make a family communications plan.
- Be alert to changing weather conditions and listen to NOAA Weather Radio.
- Look for danger signs in the sky.

### DURING A TORNADO:

#### IN YOUR HOUSE

- Go to a pre-designated shelter area such as a safe room, basement, storm cellar, or the lowest building level. If there is no basement, go to the center of an interior room on the lowest level (closet, interior hallway) away from corners, windows, doors, and outside walls. Put as many walls as possible between you and the outside. Get under a sturdy table and use your arms to protect your head and neck.
- In a high-rise building, go to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor possible.
- Put on sturdy shoes.
- Do not open windows.

#### IN YOUR CAR

- Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows; cover your head with your hands and a blanket, coat or other cushion if possible.
- If you can safely get noticeably lower than the level of the roadway, leave your car and lie in that area, covering your head with your hands.
- Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safer in a low, flat location.
- Never try to outrun a tornado in urban or congested areas in a car or truck. Instead, leave the vehicle immediately for safe shelter.
- Watch out for flying debris. **Flying debris from tornadoes causes most fatalities and injuries.**

### AFTER A TORNADO:

- Cooperate fully with public safety officials. Your presence in certain areas without request could hamper relief efforts.
- Continue to monitor your battery-powered radio for emergency information.
- Be aware of hazards from damaged structures, exposed nails, broken glass, etc. Do not touch power lines.
- Begin your family communications plan.
